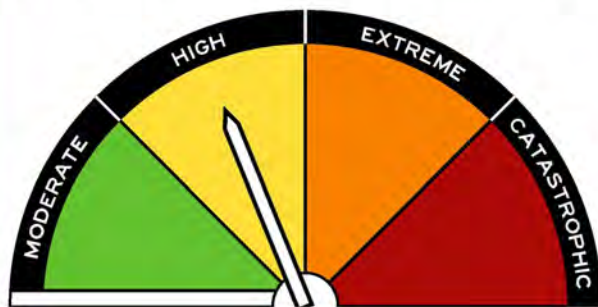

The Australian Fire Danger Ratings (AFDRS) levels are:

The AFDRS will also introduce a new Fire Behaviour Index – a scale of fire danger that takes the latest in fire science and produces outputs across eight different fire behaviour models (compared to the existing two fire behaviour models). Providing fine detail, it will support decisions about fire preparedness and bushfire suppression.

The Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) Program is redesigning the forecasting of fire by

- Improving the scientific accuracy behind fire danger predictions.
- Improving the way that fire danger is communicated.
- Providing government and industry with better decision-making tools.
- Reducing the costs associated with bushfire impacts.

This is a national program funded by the Commonwealth and all the States and Territories and delivered by local implementation teams. The AFDRS is being coordinated by NSW RFS and AFAC (the National Council for Fire and Emergency Services), with support from the Bureau of Meteorology.

A National Program Board, with representation from each of the State and Territories' fire agencies, is overseeing the program.

APPLY FOR PENSIONER RATES CONCESSIONS

Eligible pensioners or seniors may qualify for a concession from Council Rates and the Emergency Services Levy. For the 2022/23 financial year, the pensioner rates capped amount is remaining at \$750. Seniors will have their rebates capped at a maximum amount of \$100.

To register for a concession, please visit the Water Corporation's rates concession page. This application will register you with the Water Corporation and the Shire of Woodanilling via the one form, alternatively you could also call 13 13 85.

Once it is approved by the Water Corporation it will be forwarded to the Shire of Woodanilling to process on the rates .

NATIONAL DISASTER RECOVERY AND RESILIENCE FUNDING

The Shire of Woodanilling was successful in an application for a generator. This will enable the Shire to continue service delivery during the cases of emergencies. The Generator is able to be used at the Shires Recreation Centre or Administration building in an emergency event. This resource can be utilized to reduce the impact on the community and significantly enhance the use of the Recreation Centre as a Welfare Centre.



SHIRE NOTES

ARE YOUR CHIMNEYS CLEAN?

Clean Chimney and Flues, Each winter firefighters attend many house fires due to ash, soot and combustion residue that has built up inside your chimney flue. In high risk cases this residue can ignite causing a fire. In most cases you will hear loud roaring noise and see fire shooting out of your chimney. House fires can cause extensive property loss and damage, most of these are accidental and preventable.

Fires can start from:

- Embers escaping through cracks in damaged brick or metal work
- A build-up of soot and flammable material from previous winters.

All fireplaces should:

- Meet approved standards
- Be installed and maintained by a reputable business or tradesperson

When using your fireplace, it is important to:

- Avoid using combustible liquids to light open fires – use firelighters instead.
- Keep all items at least one metre away from the fireplace.
- Always use a fire screen in front of open fireplaces.
- Never leave children near the fireplace unsupervised.
- Extinguish all flames and embers completely before leaving the room.
- When disposing of ash, ensure it is completely cool and no embers remain.

WAGIN/WOODANILLING LANDCARE ZONE

Feed 365 Sheep Production Site



The trial we are hosting in partnership with DPIRD is well underway. Producer Peter Cumming has established the 4 plots which will be exploring different options to continue growing sheep consistently during the feed gaps in Autumn and Spring.

The pastures are:

- Dry sowing common Vetch, serradella, triticale, forage barley.
- Establish Teder for strategic grazing outside the traditional growing season
- Summer sowing serradella in Feb-March 2022 (20-30 kg of IMI barley) added before the break
- Twin sowing of Serradella with cereals (single or Mix) and tetraploid ryegrass—Twin sow 25 kg of French serradella (Margurita) (pods top dressed before sowing the cereal) with 80-100 kg/ha of cereals (cereal rye or triticale or forage barley or a mix of all), 5 kg/ha of tetraploid ryegrass.
- Control paddock

We will be putting sheep on the sites within the next fortnight and begin to collect grazing data on those sheep of condition score and weight going into the site, and coming off.

The establishment of the pastures has come up well and we are looking forward to seeing how this progresses over the next 3 years.





WAGIN / WOODANILLING LANDCARE ZONE

Cottonbush Outbreak in Wagin

We have recently discovered that there is an outbreak of the highly invasive cottonbush weed in Wagin.

We have been able to hold back a single producing plant towards Albany Highway, but this new outbreak is much larger and closer to town.

We urge Woodanilling locals to be on the lookout for this species—see detailed information to follow. It has caused significant problems to land owners further west, with pasture land and bush areas being completely overrun.

If you find what you think may be cottonbush, take a picture and the location and contact Gen at the office.





WAGIN/WOODANILLING LANDCARE ZONE

Narrow leaved cotton bush detail

Narrow leaf cotton bush is a formidable, highly invasive, opportunistic plant and every bit of it is toxic.

It is self-pollinating, flowers year-round, is fast growing and sets seed in its first year. It produces huge quantities of seed which disperse effectively by wind and water. Seeds also stick to animals and mud enabling spread by vehicles and machinery. Seeds remain viable in the soil for a long time and germinate in practically any conditions. The plant is allelopathic, so it drops a chemical that prevents other plants, whether pasture grasses or natural bush, from growing. That gets rid of any competition.

Control of large areas of Cotton Bush can be very expensive and even crippling for farmers, particularly when their efforts are negated by new wind and water borne infestations coming in from somewhere else in the landscape.



If you see a single plant or only a few, it has a shallow root system so small infestations can be dealt with by hand pulling - make sure you get all the roots to prevent suckering but you will need to use gloves as the toxic sap could cause a rash or other symptoms for which medical advice should be sought.

Please do contact Gen at 0428 231 506 if you think you might have this on your property and you need some help to remove it. It is very important that we prevent this weed from spreading whilst the outbreak is in its infancy and much more easily managed.

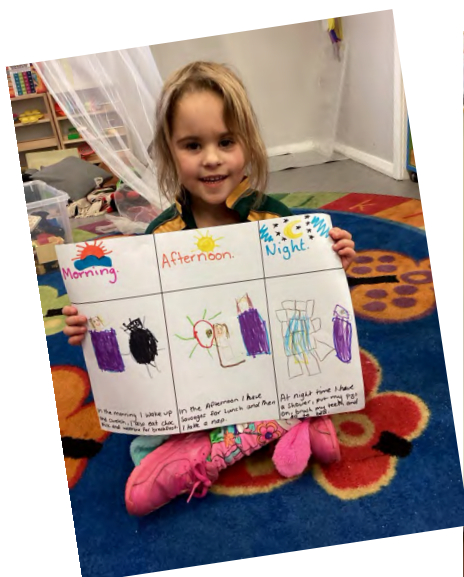

Head lice – What parents need to know

Whether your child's hair is long or short, clean or dirty, many families with school aged children and teenagers will have contact with head lice.

Be prepared and know how to treat and control head lice if there is an outbreak at your child's school.

What are head lice?

Head lice are tiny insect parasites that live in people's hair and feed on the skin on their head (scalp). They lay eggs (nits) on the hair closest to the scalp (hair shaft). Some lice can cause itching.

Head lice are not dangerous, do not carry diseases, and are not a sign of poor hygiene (cleanliness).

How do people catch head lice?

Head lice spread by head-to-head contact with another person who has head lice.

This kind of contact includes group work at school, playing or hugging.

Head lice can run from one head to another in seconds. They cannot fly, jump or swim, but they can swing from one hair to another.

Brushes and combs are unlikely to spread head lice or their eggs as they are very hard to detach from the hair shaft.

Head lice are not spread through bed linen, clothing or head gear (hats and helmets) because they do not leave the scalp unless they are moving to another person, or when they are dead or dying.

Signs and symptoms

Your scalp may itch as your skin reacts to the saliva of the head lice. This itchiness can take weeks to develop. If you have had head lice before, your skin may become less sensitive and there may be little or no itch.

You may also be able to see head lice crawling in your hair, although they can be difficult to spot as they move quickly.

- Adult lice are usually dark brown and about 2 to 3 mm long.
- Hatchlings (young lice) are often a lighter brown colour and about 1 to 2 mm long.
- Eggs will be attached to the hair shaft. They can be very tiny and hard to see, especially newly-laid eggs close to the scalp. They are grey-white and about the size of a grain of salt.

How to check for head lice

Head lice can be difficult to find.

Start by checking the hair close to the scalp, especially behind the ears and at the back of the neck. Look for lice and eggs.

If you think head lice may be present, follow these four steps:

Step 1: Apply plenty of hair conditioner (generic 'home' brands are fine) to dry hair until all hair is covered. The conditioner slows the head lice down so they can be trapped

in the comb. Comb the conditioner through the hair with an ordinary comb or brush.



Step 2: Separate the hair into sections. Gently comb each section one at a time with a metal fine-tooth 'nit comb' (available from most chemists) in four directions – forwards, backwards, left and right.

Step 3: After brushing through each section, wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a white paper towel and check towel for dark adult lice and paler hatchlings. You may need to use a magnifying glass and a strong light, such as sunlight, to see the lice, hatchlings and eggs. Continue combing and checking each section until all the hair has been checked.

Step 4: When you have finished, rinse the conditioner out and dry the hair.

It is a good idea to distract children while you check for head lice by offering them a favourite video, game or book.

How do I treat head lice?

To treat head lice you must get rid of all the lice. There are two ways to do this:

1. Try the 10-day hair conditioner and comb method
2. Buy and use head lice lotion or shampoo, and follow the instructions on the packet.

There is no need to treat the whole family unless they also have head lice.

The 10-day hair conditioner and comb method

This method is based on the **four steps** under 'How can I check for head lice?' and is repeated every other day over a 10 day period.

This method focuses on removing adult head lice from hair and breaking the egg-laying cycle.

Eggs hatch 7 to 10 days after being laid.

If you only do this method once and one or two adult head lice are missed, and the cycle of outbreaks will continue. By repeating the method over a 10 day period you increase the chance of removing all head lice until no eggs are left.

Remember – after **Step 3**, you may need to use your fingernails to remove any eggs that were missed during combing.

Head lice lotion or shampoo If you choose to use head lice lotion or shampoo always read and follow the instructions carefully. The active ingredients in these treatments are insecticides (chemicals used to kill or control insects).

Three types have been shown to be effective and safe for treating head lice. These are permethrin, pyrethrin and malathion.

Some other treatments may not have been properly tested and may be ineffective, expensive or even unsafe.

Check the product label for active ingredients.

Remember – read and follow the instructions that come with the product.



Warning

Any head lice product could cause a reaction and should not routinely be used when treating babies under six months, people with asthma, epilepsy, insecticide allergies, scalp conditions or very sensitive skin, and women who are pregnant or breastfeeding.

People who cannot use insecticides should try the 10-day hair conditioner treatment instead.

Key points about insecticides

- No head lice product is guaranteed to kill all eggs. Eggs which are not killed or removed manually will hatch 7 to 10 days after being laid.
- Before using the insecticide, rinse out any hair conditioner as it may stop the insecticide from working.
- If applying the treatment to someone else, cover their eyes to avoid getting the treatment in the person's eyes. A towel is a good way to do this.
- Following treatment, remove as many remaining eggs as possible with your fingernails. You may need to use a magnifying glass and a strong light, such as sunlight, to do this. Concentrate on 'live' eggs, which are found within 1 cm of the scalp.
- Some head lice may be resistant to an insecticide and will still be alive the morning after the treatment. If this happens, thoroughly wash out the first product and re-treat the hair the same day with a product containing a different insecticide. Alternatively, change to the 10-day hair conditioner treatment instead.

- To prevent skin irritation, do not repeat insecticide treatment more than three times, one week apart.

Household cleaning

Head lice and eggs do not survive long away from the scalp as they are human parasites.

Only pillowcases need to be washed and this should be done on the first day of treatment.

Important information for school-aged children

Under the *School Education Act 1999*, if your child has head lice a principal may keep him or her away from school until treatment has started.

Your child may return to school when all live head lice have been removed.

There is no need to stay away from school if there are only a few remaining eggs, but you must continue treatment over the following ten days to ensure that all eggs and hatchlings have been removed.

This document can be made available in alternative formats on request for a person with a disability.

While doing a Will we suggest you also look into an Enduring Power of Attorney (Finance) and an Enduring Power Guardian (Medical) - These two authorities will give your authorised agent the power to make Financial and Medical decisions that are in your best interest given the event you are incapacitated in such a manner that you are unable to do so yourself.

Lemon Garlic Roast Lamb

INGREDIENTS

1.5-1.75kg leg of lamb
 salt and cracked black pepper
 olive oil
 12 sprigs rosemary
 3 lemons, halved
 3 garlic heads, halved
 roasted vegetables, to serve



Step 1

Preheat oven to 200°C. Score the lamb at 2cm intervals and rub with salt, pepper and olive oil.

Step 2

Scatter the rosemary in a pile in the centre of a baking dish, along with lemon and garlic. Top with the lamb. Fill the baking dish with enough water to come 1cm up from the base of the dish.

Step 3

Place the lamb in the oven. For cooking time allow 30 minutes per 500g. Cover the lamb with foil after 20 minutes to avoid it becoming too brown, then uncover for the final 20 minutes of cooking. Top up the water a little as the lamb cooks to avoid the lamb drying out.

Step 4

Once the lamb is cooked through, or to your liking, remove from oven, cover and rest for 15 minutes. Slice and serve with roasted vegetables.

Pandan Crinkle Cookies

112 g butter softened	2 1/3 cups plain all purpose flour
3/4 cup brown sugar	1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 cup caster sugar	1/4 teaspoon salt
2 eggs	1/2 cup caster sugar
2 teaspoons pandan extract	1/2 cup icing sugar
1 teaspoon coconut extract	



Step 1

Preheat the oven to 160°C (320°F). Line 2 baking trays with non-stick baking paper.

Step 2

In a large bowl, cream together the butter, brown sugar and caster sugar until light and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time, scraping down the bowl and beating well to fully combine. Then add the pandan extract and coconut extract and mix to combine. Sift in the flour, baking powder and salt and then mix again until combined.

Step 3

Fill two smaller bowls with caster sugar in one and icing sugar in the other. Use an ice cream scoop or tablespoon to scoop cookie dough. Roll the balls in caster sugar first and then into the icing sugar to coat generously. You can't really use too much icing sugar here. Place on the baking tray, leaving at least 3-4 cm gap between them for cookies to spread in the oven.

Step 4

Bake for 10-15 minutes until cookies have a crackled top but are still a little soft in the center. Allow to cool completely. Repeat with remaining mixture until all cookies are baked.

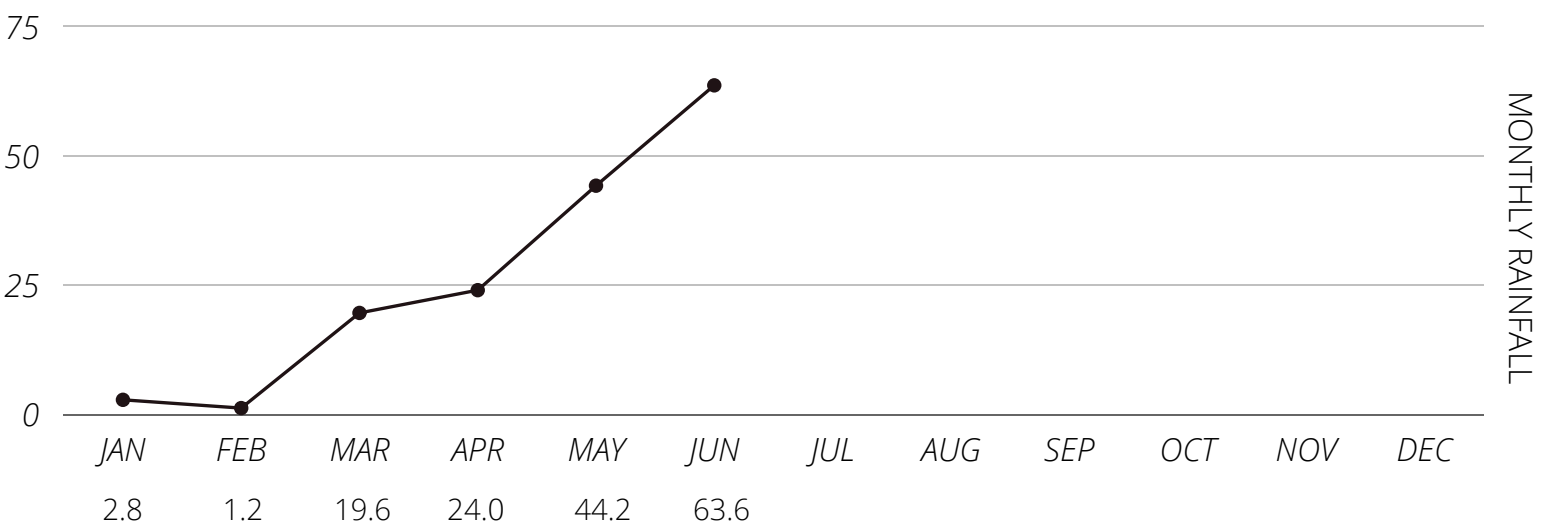
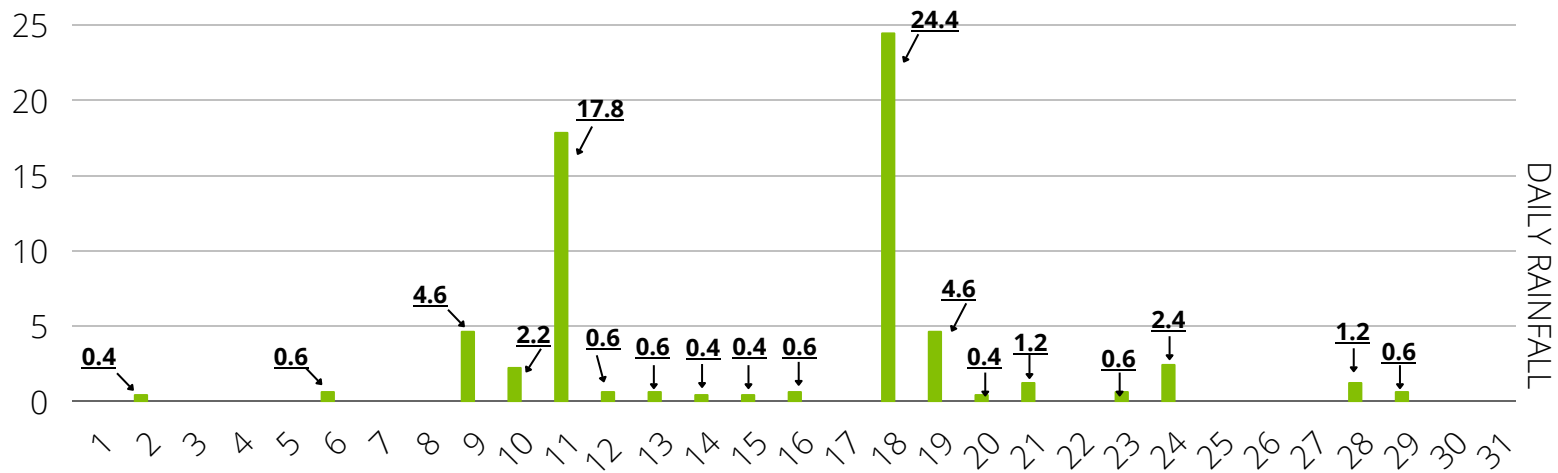
